Khapar is a tribal village in Akkalkuwa Tahsil, majority of the population is from tribal, socially and economically backward sections of Society. Khapar is located in hilly area of Satpura ranges which is on Ankaleshwar-Burahanpur State Highway. It is about 55 km. from the district place (Nandurbar) and is well connected by state highway and railway. The nearest railway stations on the main route are Nandurbar, Jalgaon, Surat, (W.R) and the airports are Vadodara (Gujarat), Aurangabad (M.S) and Indore (M.P).

Our teachers feel proud to teach tribal and hilly area students to bring them in main stream of higher education. Appearing for NAAC for accreditation is a splendid experience for us as it helps us to know our strengths and weaknesses, innovative ideas. In order to maintain standards in higher education, the college has been working upon the quality measures laid down by the North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon, UGC and NAAC.

Executive Summary & SWOC Analysis of the Institute

Executive Summary

Arts and Commerce College, Khapar is run by Sant Jagnade Maharaj Shikshan Mandal, Dondaicha. The founder President of Sant Jagnade Maharaj Shikshan Mandal Shri. V.C. Chaudhari with a generous vision of imparting higher education to tribal area students established Arts and Commerce College, Khapar in 1996.

Arts and Commerce College, Khapar is affiliated to North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. At present, the college has Arts stream with an enrollment of 259 students (2016-2017). The college is situated in the hilly and tribal area of Akkalkuwa Taluka approximately 95% students are from scheduled tribes, i.e. Bhill community. The students come from villages known as 'Padas' facing a lot of problems such as irregular electric supply and transportation, students aspire to take higher education from our college; these students are the first generation learners from their families.

The teachers of the college search eligibile students on their 'Padas' or villages and counsel their parents about the significance of education and the parents send their wards to our college. The college offers U.G. Programme only in the Arts faculty. In the B.A. programme Marathi, Hindi, History and Geography are taught at special level and Economics, Defence and Strategic Studies, Political Science and Compulsory English are taught at General level.

The students' academic progress is monitored through tests, tutorials and oral discussions. As the college is located in tribal area, teachers need various teaching methods to make students understand various subjects. Imparting higher eduation to tribal area students is the mission of the college. Admissions are given on first come first serve basis, as per university rules. The reservation policies are followed as per the State Govt. rules.

The staff members update their knowledge by attending Referesher Courses, Orientation Programmes, Seminars, Conferences, and Workshops. Four faculty members are Ph.D., four faculty membes are SET/NET qualified and four are M.Phil and five faculty members have registered for Ph.D.The N.S.S. unit of the college, Student Welfare Department, Yuvati Sabha, Tribal Heritage, College Anniversary Day, Birthday celebrations of teaching and non-teaching staff create family culture in college campus. Each and every activity of the college curricular, extra -curricular, academic is an ideal model for students. The college tries to make the campus environment friendly.

The Management of the college with a generous vision of imparting higher education to first generation learners provides all the required facilities to the college. The Library of the college plays a key role in teaching -learning process which guides, counsels students and staff for updating their knowledge by providing various required services. The Sports department of the college has the equipment related for sports and motivates students to participate in various sports activities.

The Management, The Principal, the teaching and non-teaching staff of our college tries to cultivate various values among students to make them good citizens of the nation.

- Interactions with the industry, needs to be enhanced. The College is situated in hilly area where heavy industry is not available; the interactions are mostly concentrated with the service industries.
- Tribal/hilly area location of college affects frequent visits of eminent academicians.
- Limited scope in expansion in existing building.
- More dropouts till final year as poverty, early marriage & migration for livelihood compels to leave further higher education.
- Students from tribal community, hence limitations on participations in co-curricular and extension activities.
- Less job opportunities at local level.
- Irregular electric supply.
- Proficiency in English speaking and Marathi.
- Need based courses.
- No funds from Govt. or any other agencies.

Opportunities:

- To introduce job oriented and professional courses.
- To develop communication skills and computer literacy of tribal and hilly area students.
- Scope to initiate and develop tribal area students for sports and competitive examinations.
- To develop interest for ICT based teaching-learning and evaluation process.

Challenges:

- Students increasing drop out due to lack of family and social support.
- No non-salary grants from the Govt.of Maharashtra.
- Teaching of traditional courses.
- Transportations.
- Irregular electric supply and insufficient speed of internet becomes difficult task for using technology in teaching-learning process.
- Language barriers.

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Vision:

To impart higher education to rural, hilly and tribal area students to bring them into the main stream of higher education (to develop good citizens of nation.)

Mission:

"Tamso Ma Jyotirgamya" (from ignorance to knowledge, which empowers the tribal and hilly area students through arts, social sciences and technology with global vision.)

Objectives:

- To bring the tribal and hilly area students to the main stream of higher education.
- To eliminate the shyness and inferior complex of hilly and tribal area students by creating competence & confidence.
- To motivate the tribal students towards competitive examinations.
- To develop rational outlook among tribal and hilly area students.
- To impart value education to create good citizens of India.

The vision, mission and objectives of the institution are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and the other stakeholders through the college prospectus, the college magazine, "Gitai", through the programmes, activities and the college website www.sjmsmkhaparcollege.org

Teaching and non-teaching staff are communicated about the Vision and Mission of the Institution by the Management and the Principal in various meetings.

The objectives are displayed on boards and are made known in each and every programme like welcome and farewell day functions, N.S.S., Students Welfare department, Annual Gathering and extracurricular activities.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

- To achieve this, the College offers following strategies.
- The College appoints qualified teaching staff.
- Students are provided adequate infrastructure and learning environment.
- N.S.S. plays a very important role which conducts various activities such as AIDS awareness, health awareness, tree plantation, Vanrai Bandhara, personality development programmes in winter camps and regular activities.
- Almost all programmes of the College are organized with an aim of empowerment of Tribal area students and also to create an in-built value education.
- Our college is affiliated to North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. The
 University designs the curriculum and the college implements it as per the
 guidelines of University by qualified staff with suitable teaching
 methodologies.
- For the effective implementation of the curriculum the college undertakes various measures for planning and implementation of it such as tests, tutorials, projects, home assignments etc.
- At the beginning of academic year, the institution prepares an academic calender of various activities and prepares action plans for various departments. In the staff meetings every activity is discussed.
- The prepared action plan with the outline of curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular and other activities is executed as per instructions given by the Principal.
- The teachers prepare annual teaching plan at the beginning of the academic year and it is submitted to the Principal.
- Revised syllabi are communicated to the college by North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon by circulars and workshops. The faculty attends the workshop on revision of syllabus and then it is implemented.
- The faculty prepares time-table and teaching plans for the effective teaching -learning process, the process of teaching includes evaluation, student- centric methods of teaching and so on.
- Academic calendar is brought into practice just to develop and deploy effective implementation of curriculum.
- The effective and suitable methodologies are used by the teachers for hilly and tribal area students.
- The Management, The Principal, The IQAC Committee guides the faculty time to time.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The teachers receive support from the institution for effectively implementing the curriculum. The faculty members attend workshops, and seminars organized by the university to update the knowledge and to improve the teaching practices.

- The College encourages faculty members to attend Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses & Short-term courses. These courses provide necessary skills for effective implementation of curriculum and improving teaching practices.
- Teachers are allowed to participate in conferences, seminars, workshops and granted duty leave by the College.
- Faculty members are encouraged to register for M.Phil., Ph.D., and to fulfill NET/SET qualifications and are supported to work on research projects.
- In staff common meetings faculty members are also advised to update their academic and professional profile.
- Qualified teachers have been appointed in the college as per norms of UGC, State Government and North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon.
- The college provides texts and reference books and other teaching reference material like magazines.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The curriculum is designed by the North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon.For effective curriculum delivery; following steps are taken by the institution.

- The Principal regularly conducts meetings and encourages accepting new teaching- learning practices for effective teaching.
- One of the members of the College is a Board of Study member of various Universities who motivates and guides the faculty for effective teaching learning; other faculty members participate in syllabus framing workshops organized by the University.
- The curriculum provided by the University is discussed in the meetings conducted by the Principal.
- Remedial steps are taken for any deviations in the deployment of curriculum.
- The Management and the Principal has provided computer, internet and LCD Projector for effective Teaching- Learning.
- Conventional chalk and black- board method is used for lectures.
- The curriculum provided by the University is discussed in the staff meetings.
- Students' seminars are organized where the students are allowed to make presentations on topics of their interest related to the curriculum.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

Academic audit is done by the University through Quality Enhancement Committee which visits to check operationalisation of the curriculum. The College is located in tribal area most of the students are from hilly area.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

- Staff members attend conferences organized by the University and provide necessary inputs collected through the oral feedback from students to develop curriculum.
- Students' feedback and teachers' feedback are discussed in the College meetings and oral suggestions are forwarded to the university through BOS or faculty members' participation in workshops.
- The curriculum is designed by duly constituted academic bodies like the academic council, the faculty and the board of studies.
- Experienced staff members are involved in procedure of curriculum design by attending syllabus framing workshops and conferences.

- Our Institution provides sports facilities to students, which are helpful for students to show their skills.
- Awareness for more usage of the Hindi language locally and nationally is undertaken by the Hindi Department through various programmes such as Hindi day, essay writing, paper presentation.

- The tribal heritage committee has recently established in college for community orientation purpose The faculty directly by visiting tribal communities communicates with them about their customs, rituals & traditions & create awareness about education. The faculty visited 'Kathi' -' Holi Festival ', Devmogra fair , Khapar fair through tribal heritage committee.
- One of our faculty members is founder member of Animal Welfare Association, Jalgaon, NGO in Jalgaon city, as well as Secretary, of Astavinayak Mandir Trust, Jalgaon.

- Institutional mechanism is in place for admission under the direct supervision of the Principal and co-ordinated by the programme wise formed Admission Committees.

- University has introduced Environment Education and General Knowledge papers as the compulsory papers at U.G.level (FYBA& SYBA), passing of these papers is made mandatory. The Internal Examination includes tests, tutorials and seminars.



The committee discusses and plans to develop tribal heritage in campus and outside the campus. Nandurbar District itself was separated from Dhule District in 1998 to facilitate the tribal area people. It has the east- west Satpura ranges at the North -West of Maharashtra containing the Tapi and Narmada Basin. The total population of Akkalkuwa Taluka is approximately 90 % of Schedule Tribes. Due to the lack of transport in this region the prime residential core remain quite long from the improvements.

3. Context: Our College is located in tribal area and the nearby villages are called as "Padas", our teachers go home to home in search of students to provide them higher education and to study the culture of tribal people in order to bring this culture before the world. We have formed this tribal heritage committee where our teachers study customs, rituals and culture of tribal people.

4. Practice:

- To study the tribal culture.
- Our staff members and students are involved in organizing tribal cultural programmes.
- In this tribal heritage committee organizing various programmes and competitions for tribal heritage is the main purpose; some poems are collected in Adiwasi language.
